BEST FOR PORTABILITY Davek Solo

Folding umbrellas are the easiest
to carry, but the rigid aluminum
ribs in most models inevitably
falter in the wind. This taut
43-inch push-button automatic
uses fiberglass reinforcements to
rebound after a gust. It's pricey,
but the tech works — and if you
lose it, Davek will sell you another
one for half the price.

BEST FOR STYLE POINTS Francesco Maglia

A James Bondian pairing of brute function and high flair. Italian craftsmen build these stick umbrellas from shafts of hardwood, then top them in solid or pinstripe fabric over a 10-rib steel frame. In the hand, it feels as finely crafted as a mechanical watch. You just have to be dressed up enough to not be upstaged.

BEST FOR DADS GustBuster Doorman

\$80; gustbuster.com
Carrying an umbrella with a seriously massive 68-inch canopy might get you into a fight on crowded city streets, but it proves to be a lifesaver if you're herding kids during a downpour. At 1.9 pounds, the Doorman is best for shorter treks. Teardropshaped vents keep wind from turning it into a missile.

BEST FOR WIND Senz Automatic

During wind shears, the funky,
asymmetrical canopy of this
umbrella twists short side first,
preventing it from blowing out
backward. We liked that the
shallow design provides clear
sight lines but found its compact
diameter (34 inches lengthwise)
isn't well suited for taller guys —
we ended up with damp legs.
